At Principled Technologies, we tested several popular Android apps on two Chromebooks: a Samsung Chromebook Pro powered by an Intel Core m3 processor, and a Samsung Chromebook Plus with an Arm® Rockchip processor. We compared how long it took each Chromebook to complete common tasks, and found that the Intel Core m3 processor-powered device was consistently faster. That time savings grows with repetition—so two seconds here and there could save you hours in the long run.

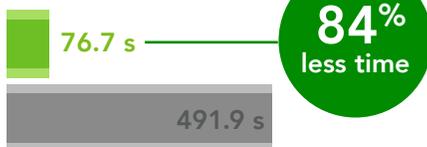
With the time saved using the Intel Core m3 processor-based Samsung Chromebook Pro, you could make longer strides in your pet projects, or get more me-time in before work. From video editing to collaboration tools, the Intel processor-powered Chromebook responded faster in our tests, translating to a better overall experience for the user—you.

## Less time waiting while video editing and rendering

Editing video can often be a time-consuming process. Whether you're sorting through vacation footage or putting together a volunteer project, Chromebooks now offer Android apps to help you out. When it came to the processor-demanding work of rendering videos, the Intel Core m3 processor-powered Chromebook saved us time, every time. For example, encoding a single HD video in PowerDirector with the Intel Core m3 processor-powered device saved nearly seven minutes. Since you'll often need to render many versions of a video as you make adjustments, the time you save grows with each export.

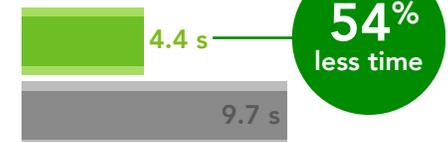

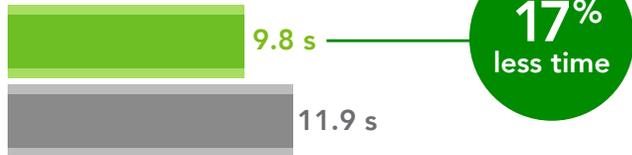

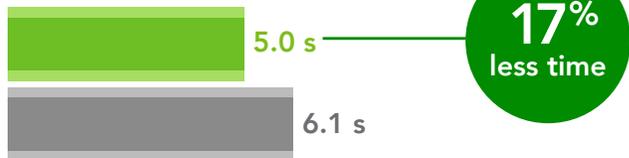

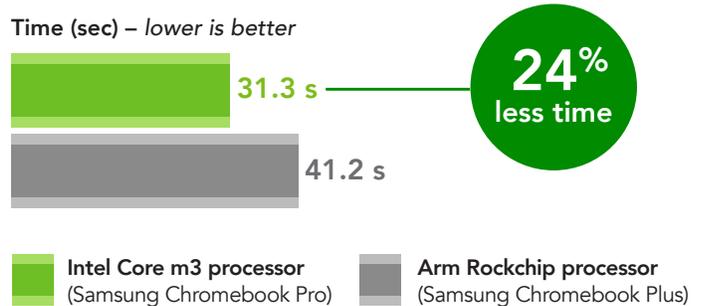
### Opening Google Docs document in Google Drive™

Time (sec) – lower is better



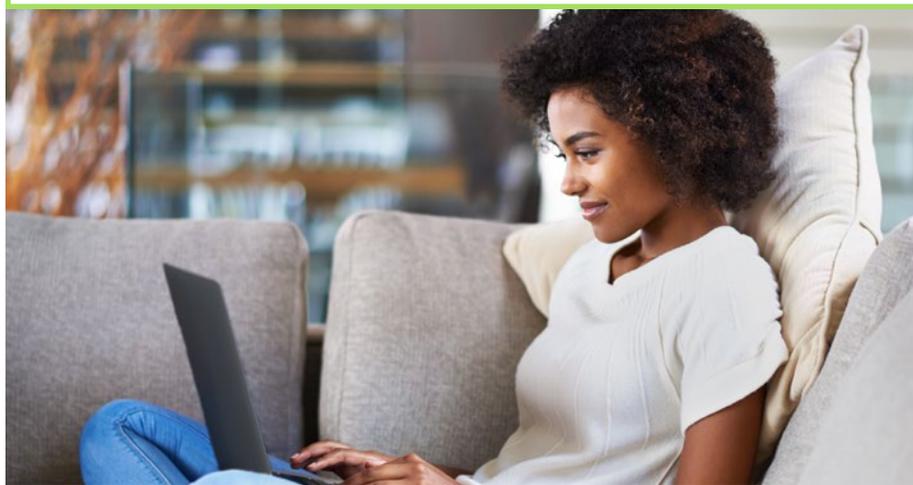
### Opening Google Sheets spreadsheet in Google Drive

# Appendix B: How we tested

## Creating the background workload

To simulate typical Chromebook use, we ran a combination of news, email, chat, document viewing, music, and social media websites in the background. For websites that required accounts, we created test profiles and logged in the users on each device.

1. From the shelf, open Chromebook settings.
2. Navigate to the On Startup section of the settings, and select Open a specific page or set of pages.
3. Select Open a specific page or set of pages, insert the following URLs, and click OK.

4. Restart the Chromebook. Before testing, navigate through each tab to ensure that both devices have fully loaded all the same content.

## Testing each application

The applications we tested

### PowerDirector Video Editor App: 4K, Slow Mo & More

#### Encoding an HD video

1. Install PowerDirector from the Google Play Store, and pin the app to the shelf.
2. Launch the app from the shelf, and select Allow to enable access to device media storage.
3. Click the New Project icon, and enter a name for the test project.
4. Click the Download folder, and click the test footage to insert the footage onto the timeline.
5. Press the layers icon, and select the text icon to insert a title into the beginning of the clip. Name the title "Test HD Video."
6. Click the Export icon.
7. Click More Output Options.
8. With HD video resolution selected, start the timer and click Next.
9. When the video share screen appears, stop the timer.

#### Encoding an SD video

1. From the shelf, click the PowerDirector Video Editor icon to launch the app.
2. Load the saved test project.
3. Click the Export icon.
4. Click More Output Options.
5. With SD video resolution selected, start the timer and click Next.
6. When the video share screen appears, stop the timer.

### Instagram

#### Posting a video to feed

1. Install Instagram from the Google Play Store, and pin the app to the shelf.
2. Launch the app from the shelf, and click Sign up with email or phone number.
3. Click the Email tab, and enter the testing account's email address.
4. Enter a name, password, and click Next.
5. Enter a user name, and click Next.
6. Click Skip to skip connecting to a Facebook account.
7. Click Skip again to confirm.

8. Click Skip to skip adding a profile photo.
9. Click the + icon.
10. Click Allow to enable access to device media storage.
11. From the Gallery tab, click the test video footage.
12. Click Next.
13. At the filter and trim screen, click Next.
14. Start the timer, and click Share.
15. When video playback begins on the test user's feed, stop the timer.

## Video Editor (WeVideo Inc.)

### Saving a video for free

1. Install Video Editor from the Google Play Store, and pin the app to the shelf.
2. Launch the app from the shelf, and click Allow to enable device media storage access.
3. Click the + icon.
4. Click Gallery.
5. Click the Download folder.
6. Select the test footage, and click the green checkmark icon.
7. From the timeline editor, click the Title box.
8. Enter a title ("Test Video"), and click the checkmark icon.
9. Click the send icon.
10. Start the timer, and click Save with Watermark.
11. When the share dialog appears, stop the timer.

## Lomotif – Music Video Editor

### Exporting a video

1. Install Lomotif from the Google Play Store, and pin the app to the shelf. Launch the app from the shelf, and click Start now!
2. Click Allow to enable access to device media storage.
3. Click the Download folder.
4. Select the test footage, and click the Next arrow.
5. Select the first background music (Despacito (feat. Justin Bieber) [Remix], Luis Fonsi & Daddy Yankee), and click the Next arrow.
6. Click the export icon.
7. Start the timer, and click Yes to confirm the video export.
8. When the video export completes, stop the timer.

## FlipaClip – Cartoon Animation

### Creating a 720p 30 FPS movie from 90 frames

1. Install FlipaClip from the Google Play Store, and pin the app to the shelf.
2. Launch the app from the shelf.
3. Select your age, and click I Accept to accept the license agreement.
4. Select the sample project, and click Edit.
5. Click the FPS field, and scroll to change Frames Per Second to 30. Click the check mark.
6. Click Save Changes.
7. Click the project again to open it.
8. From the timeline, press the plus icon until a total of 90 frames are present in the clip.
9. For every 10th frame, select the frame, and click the Text icon to insert a title. Type `Test sequence [1-10]`
10. Click the dropdown menu icon, and select Make movie.
11. Start the timer, and click Make Movie.
12. When the export finishes, stop the timer.

## Adobe Photoshop Lightroom

### Saving an image to Gallery (highest quality)

1. Install Adobe Photoshop Lightroom from the Google Play Store, and pin the app to the shelf.
2. Launch the app from the shelf, and click Get Started.
3. Click Add Your Photos, and click Allow to let Lightroom access photos on the device.
4. Select the test photo, and click Add.
5. When the photo is in the default collection, click the Photo.

6. Open the photo menu.
7. Click Save to Gallery, and select Highest Available Quality.
8. Start the timer, and click OK.
9. When the completed export dialog appears, stop the timer.

## Adobe Photoshop Mix

### Loading the crop menu

1. Install Adobe Photoshop Mix from the Google Play Store, and pin the app to the shelf.
2. Launch the app from the shelf, and select Get a free Adobe ID.
3. Fill in the required details for an account, and click Sign Up.
4. Click OK to acknowledge Automatic Backup.
5. Click the first example project (Clock in the sky).
6. Start the timer, and click the Crop icon.
7. When the crop menu fully loads, stop the timer.

## Pixlr – Free Photo Editor

### Creating a collage from 10 images

1. Install Pixlr – Free Photo Editor from the Google Play Store, and pin the app to the shelf.
2. Launch the app from the shelf, and click I Accept to accept the license agreement.
3. Click the collage icon.
4. Click Allow to enable access to device media storage.
5. From the Download folder, select the 10 test images to be made into a collage.
6. Click the done button.
7. At the collage preview screen, click next.
8. At the filter and text screen, click done.
9. At the share screen, click Save Image.
10. With Max (5000 \* 5000) resolution selected, start the timer and click OK.
11. When the image save dialog closes, stop the timer.

## Google Drive

### Opening a Google Docs document

1. Install Google Drive from the Google Play Store, and pin the app to the shelf.
2. Launch the app from the shelf.
3. Start the timer, and click the test Google Docs document from the Files list.
4. When the document fully loads, stop the timer.

### Opening a Google Sheets spreadsheet

1. Launch Google Drive from the Shelf.
2. Start the timer, and click the test Google Sheets document from the Files list.
3. When the document fully loads, stop the timer.
